



Master's Degree in Philosophy and Theological Anthropology

Program Overview

The Master's Degree in Philosophy and Theological Anthropology (M.A.Phil.) at the Universidad Católica Americana (UNICA) is a rigorous graduate program designed to form scholars and professionals capable of developing advanced philosophical reasoning, analytical depth, and research competence in the humanities and social thought.

This program focuses on the critical intersection between classical philosophy, modern epistemology, and contemporary ethical and cultural issues, equipping students with the intellectual tools necessary to interpret, critique, and reconstruct ideas within today's pluralistic and technological context.

The M.A.Phil. trains graduates to move beyond mere conceptual analysis toward applied philosophical inquiry, connecting reflection with human and social transformation. It develops abilities in reasoning, interpretation, ethical judgment, and theoretical innovation, ensuring that philosophical knowledge contributes to interdisciplinary dialogue and the pursuit of the common good.

This two-year graduate program (60 credits) provides intensive formation in philosophical foundations, research methods, ethics, and transdisciplinary integration, preparing professionals to:

- Conduct philosophical research in academic, cultural, or institutional contexts.
- Teach philosophy and humanities at higher education levels.
- Engage in ethical consulting, critical analysis, and cultural mediation.
- Contribute to interdisciplinary and humanistic projects that promote dignity, rationality, and justice.

The M.A.Phil. at UNICA represents an academic space for rigorous reflection, ethical responsibility, and intellectual creativity in service of humanity.



Justification

The Master's Degree in Philosophy and Theological Anthropology responds to the pressing need to reaffirm humanistic and critical thought in an era dominated by technological acceleration, information overload, and moral uncertainty. Modern societies require philosophers capable of interpreting complexity, questioning assumptions, and articulating meaning in fields ranging from science and politics to culture and ethics.

This master's program is justified by three core imperatives:

1. Reconstruction of Rationality:

To train thinkers who can bridge classical wisdom with contemporary paradigms, overcoming the fragmentation of knowledge.

2. Ethical and Cultural Responsibility:

To develop philosophical discernment that addresses dilemmas in technology, bioethics, politics, and education through ethical reasoning and anthropological reflection.

3. Research and Knowledge Production:

To generate new philosophical perspectives through original research that nourishes academic dialogue and fosters intercultural understanding.

Methodology and Evaluation

- **Project-Based and Blended Methodology:**
Synchronous classes, analytical seminars, writing workshops, and individualized thesis mentoring.
- **Emphasis on Applied Research:**
The program culminates in a Final Graduate Project (12 credits), which may take one of two forms:
 - An original research thesis (a contribution to philosophical knowledge), or
 - A Professional Project (application of philosophical reasoning to an ethical, cultural, or educational problem).
- **Continuous Evaluation:**
Based on analytical essays, philosophical discussions, research proposals, and the public defense of the thesis or capstone project.

Institutional Observations and Compliance

Admission requires a Bachelor's degree in philosophy, humanities, social sciences, or a related discipline, and demonstrable capacity for abstract reasoning and critical reflection.

UNICA will adapt admission processes and documentation according to State of Texas regulations and accreditation standards applicable to graduate-level programs.
